

Satisfactory Academic Standards: Federal regulations require that all student financial aid recipients maintain a minimum 2.0 cumulative grade point average (GPA) in all college-level courses attempted. This requirement applies to all students receiving federal financial aid, regardless of whether they are receiving aid through a scholarship, grant, or loan. The GPA is calculated based on all college-level courses attempted, including those that are repeated. The GPA is calculated based on the following components:

Attempted course credits include completed credits

the end of each semester for degree-seeking students.

Financial Aid Warning

Financial aid will be suspended for students who do not meet the minimum standards for financial aid while on financial aid warning.

Standards:

Students who are on financial aid warning must meet the minimum standards for financial aid while on financial aid warning. Students who do not meet the minimum standards for financial aid while on financial aid warning will be suspended from financial aid. Students who are on financial aid warning must meet the minimum standards for financial aid while on financial aid warning.

Aid Suspension:

- Students who do not successfully complete any courses in a given semester will be suspended from financial aid for the following semester (2025 and beyond)

These students must follow the Appeals process described below or use means other than financial aid for continuing to support their education. Students who are on financial aid warning must meet the minimum standards for financial aid while on financial aid warning.

Students who fail to attain SAI after the financial aid warning semester may appeal for loss of aid.

Academic Improvement: Reviewed and signed by the student's Academic Advisor.

Special Circumstances: Reviewed and signed by the Financial Aid Office. Examples of special circumstances include:

- Death of an immediate family member
- Student injury or illness
- Other special circumstances

Appeals: Reviewed and signed by the Financial Aid Office.

Financial Aid Probation

Students who are successful in completing the Financial Aid Probation

receive aid for:

One subsequent semester, or a maximum of two semesters, if the student

meets the eligibility requirements and maintains satisfactory academic progress

and meets all other Federal, state and institutional requirements.

Students who do not meet the requirements for probation will be placed on Financial Aid Termination. Students who are placed on Financial Aid Termination will not be eligible for financial aid for the next two semesters.

Students who are placed on Financial Aid Termination may appeal the decision to the Financial Aid Director. The appeal process is outlined in the Financial Aid Handbook.

Financial Aid Termination

Students who do not meet the requirements for probation will be placed on Financial Aid Termination. Students who are placed on Financial Aid Termination will not be eligible for financial aid.

NO. 10. Wabash College will not accept a student who is on probation or Financial Aid Suspension or Financial Aid Termination.

Students who are placed on Financial Aid Termination will not be eligible for financial aid for the next two semesters.

Financial aid will be awarded to eligible students in accordance with the policies and procedures established by the Office of the Dean of the College.
